Sunday, August 11, 2003 Lubumbashi, Democratic Republic of the Congo

My wife, Barbara, and I awakened early on this sunny Sunday morning in southern Congo. The plan was to leave around 8:00 a.m. so we would arrive at the village church before their service began at 10:00.

We had come to the D.R.C. to be with Ted and Pat Grosbach, missionaries to this vast central African nation, 15 minutes out of

After appropriate greetings and introductions, I was invited to preach the gospel. I began with Romans 5:6-8, which speaks of Christ's death for us while we were still sinners, still ungodly, and still without strength. I showed from these verses the general condition of us all: we are weak and therefore we sin. I then pointed them to the New Birth, by which God deals with our sin through forgiveness and our weakness by the power of the Holy Spirit.

We left the church building and headed down a trail to the baptismal sight. The walk was about a quarter of a mile. The day was hot and dry. As we approached, we could see that a small group had already arrived at the baptismal site, which was also the principal water source for the village.

Once we arrived, six people were baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of sins.
